Item of interest gleaned from a 1936 newspaper

NO NEW STAMPS FOR CORONATION

the reign of King George VI. is not likely to be ready for May 12, the date of the Coronation. No King Edward VIII, stamps of new denominations will be issued.

So many complicated processes have to be gone through before the approval of the design of a new issue that stamps of one reign are always current for several months during the reign following.

King George V. stamps did not appear until 13 months after his accession.

Before the King Edward stamps

were issued experts were engaged for many weeks in preparing drawings, which were weeded out by a committee appointed by the Postmaster-General before a specimen set could be sent to King Edward for his approval.

ARTISTS OBJECTED

The halfpenny, three-halfpenny and twopence-halfpenny stamps of King Edward issue were immediately popular. Over 30,000,000 stamps were sold on the first day—50 per cent. above the normal figure — and 130,000,000 were sold during the first five days.

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NEW ARRANGEMENT FOR THE SPS SYLLABUS

At the initiative of the syllabus secretary and in order to refresh, stimulate and invigorate the programme for future meetings, it has been agreed by the committee that a triumvirate of the president, secretary and current syllabus incumbent coordinate a new approach. This will be based on putting together a programme of meetings for the next year organised around suggestions from the membership as a whole.

As you are all aware there are some 11 months of meetings comprised of 11 Zoom meetings, 11 members' meetings and 11 display meetings (the latter involving presentations by existing SPS members or outside visiting speakers).

The 11 members' meetings already have an inbuilt number of pre-arranged slots comprised of the AGM, competition entry explanations and results, countries beginning with particular letters of the alphabet and the annual display of 8 sheets – no rules.

Already I have received the following suggestions for a future syllabus:

High value postage stamps
Postage stamps from countries that no longer exist
A presentation by a competition judge
Something different – displays of philatelic paraphernalia
Recent acquisitions in previous 6 months
Thematic topics such as democracy, remote locations, steam on stamps, electricity on stamps, independence etc
Postcards
Postal stationery

If you have any topics that you would like to be a subject for next year's syllabus, please submit these in the next few months to either myself, Neil Ritchie or Richard Hindle and these can become part of the overall scheme for consideration for next year's syllabus programme

We look forward to some innovative, eclectic and imaginative suggestions for potential topics.
